AB 988, as it passed the Assembly, required an entity seeking moneys from the 988 State Suicide and Behavioral Health Crisis Services Fund to include in its annual expenditure and outcomes report the number of individuals who used the crisis services and self-identified as veterans or active military personnel.

AB 1317 as amended in Senate June 23, 2023

(Pursuant to Joint Rule 26.5)

AB 1317, as it passed the Assembly, required the owner of qualifying residential property, as defined, that provides parking with the qualifying residential property to unbundle parking from the price of rent, as prescribed. AB 1317, as it passed the Assembly, among other requirements, required an owner of qualifying residential property where unbundled parking is not possible to provide a tenant with an annual itemization of the market rate cost of parking, as defined, for the parking spaces that are included in their lease.

The Senate amendments delete that requirement for the provision of an annual itemization of the market rate cost of parking and related provisions, and, instead, prohibit the breach of a separately leased parking agreement from forming the basis of any unlawful detainer action against the tenant. The Senate amendments also authorize a property owner, if a tenant fails to pay by the 30th day following the date payment is owed for a separately leased parking space, to revoke that tenant’s right to lease that parking spot. The Senate amendments also add a coauthor.

AB 50 as amended in Senate September 8, 2023

(Pursuant to Joint Rule 26.5)

AB 50, as it passed the Assembly, required a public utility to furnish timely service, instrumentalities, equipment, and facilities, and required the Public Utilities Commission, on or before January 1, 2025, to determine the criteria for timely service for electric customers. AB 50, as it passed the Assembly, also required, until the commission determined the criteria, specific energization timelines for certain categories of service, including, among other things, that each large electrical corporation take all practical measures to deliver electric service within 90 days of issuing a written commitment to serve for customers seeking a new connection, and within 30 days of issuing a written commitment to serve for customers seeking upgrades to an existing connection.

The Senate amendments delete the provision requiring a public utility to furnish timely service, instrumentalities, equipment, and facilities. The Senate amendments also delete the energization timelines described above and instead require each electrical corporation that energized less than 35% of customers with completed applications exceeding 12 months in duration by January 31, 2023, to submit a report to the commission, as specified, on or before December 1, 2024, demonstrating that the electrical corporation has energized 80% of customers with applications deemed complete as of January 31, 2023. The Senate amendments, among other things, authorize the commission to modify or adjust these requirements for any electrical corporation with fewer than 100,000 service connections, exclude electrical cooperatives from its provisions, and define the terms “energization” and “energize” for these purposes.

AB 297 as amended in Senate September 8, 2023

(Pursuant to Joint Rule 26.5)

AB 297, as it passed the Assembly, extended, from January 1, 2024, to January 1, 2034, the authority of the Director of Forestry and Fire Protection to authorize advance payments from a grant award under the local assistance grant program for fire prevention activities, defined to include grazing activities, and home hardening education activities, including public education outreach activities.

The Senate amendments change the definition of fire prevention activities to include prescribed grazing and expand allowable public education outreach activities to include training on prescribed grazing. The Senate amendments indefinitely extend the above-described authority to authorize advance grant payments and explicitly authorize certain advance payments for the purpose of purchasing necessary supplies. The Senate amendments also conform a cross-reference to existing law.
