

# **Seaport Facilities**





## **Diminished Services for Ag Exporters**

- As of February 1, 2022
  - > 7 vessels at berth
  - 8 vessels at anchor
  - ▶ 6 drifting
  - ▶ 1 en-route
- ▶ 8 out of 25 historical weekly services are bypassing Oakland
- 62 vessel calls in Dec 2021 vs 94 Dec 2022
- ► Larger Vessel Calls and Warehouse Delays Have Caused a Build Up of Empty Containers & Chassis Shortages Which Create Marine Terminal Congestion
- ► Need a Consistent Flow of Services to Reduce Congestion and Serve Agricultural Exporters = Return of Vessel Calls to Select Markets



## **Impacts to Agricultural Exporters**

► Key CA Agricultural Commodity Exports Heavily Impacted (Dec. 2021 vs. Dec. 2020) through Port of Oakland

Dried Nuts: -35%

► Hay: -35%

▶ Rice: -73%

▶ Wine: -25%

► Citrus: -50%

▶ Dairy: -11%

- Overall, Top 10 Ag Commodity Volumes down <u>36%</u> (Dec. 2021 vs. Dec. 2020) through Port of Oakland
- California as a whole losing export market share compared to East Coast port gateways



# Port of Oakland/USDA Agricultural Exporter Incentive Program

Acreage: 22 Acres on-port

Capacity: 8000 FEU

Refrigerated ContainerPlugs: 140

Operator: PCMC

- Ag Exporter Incentive: \$125 per container (announced by USDA)
- Refrigerated Container pre-trip inspections available

- Features and Benefits:
  - No appointment required
  - Multiple Ocean Carrier equipment available
  - ► Faster truck turn times
  - More flexibility when vessel schedules change
  - Financial Incentives for agricultural exporters



## **Ongoing Needs for Export Community**

- Maintain export cargo receiving windows when vessel schedules change
- Availability of space on Ad-hoc vessel calls for export cargo
- Return of key geographic shipping routes through Oakland, particularly ports in Southeast Asia and India

#### Benefits to Exporters:

- Reduced costs and increased competitiveness for CA-based Ag shippers
- Increased availability for chassis and driver availability
- Many Ag exporters in the Central Valley prefer the Port of Oakland as an export gateway



#### **Additional Partnership Opportunities with State**

- Governor's January Budget Blueprint
  - Supply Chain Resiliency and Port Infrastructure Funding (\$1.2 billion)
  - ► CARB & CEC Zero Emissions Vehicle and Infrastructure (\$875 million)
  - GO-Biz Supply Chain Data Connectivity Initiatives (\$30 million)
- Trade Corridor Enhancement Program
  - Round 3 program guidelines in development by CA Transportation Commission
- Port Priorities:
  - ▶ Electrical Capacity & Renewable Energy and Resiliency Initiatives
  - Modernization of On-port Marine Terminal and Warehousing Facilities to serve the Export community
